Annexure – II FACULTY FEEDBACK ANALYSES (2012-2013)

A. Curricular Aspect

1. Relevance of the syllabus to real life situation

- Among Associate professors, about 18.9% disagree and 46.6% agree that the syllabus is relevant to real life situation. 16.2% of Associate professors are neutral to this condition.
- ➤ All the Senior Assistant professors i.e. 100% are neutral to the same condition.
- ➤ The percentages of Assistant professor who are neutral and agree to this condition are 29.4% and 58.8% respectively
- Again, among Guest faculties, about 18.5%, are neutral, 7.4% strongly agrees and 48.1% agrees to the condition.
- ➤ The whole time faculties who have agreed to the condition are 50.0%. Those who are neutral are approximately 33%.
- ➤ However the rest of the ratings of all the faculties are not that satisfactory.

2. Depth of the course content

- Among Associate professors, about 35.1% agree to the above condition. 29.7% of Associate professors are neutral to this condition.
- ➤ All Senior Assistant professors i.e. 100% are respectively neutral to the same condition.
- ➤ The percentages of Assistant professor who are neutral and agree to this condition are 27.0% and 56.8% respectively
- Again, among Guest faculties, about 7.4%, are neutral, 25.9% strongly agrees and 55.6% agrees to the condition.
- ➤ The whole time faculties who have agreed to the condition are 55.2%. Those who are neutral are approximately 24.1%.

- Again, among Teachers, about 16.7% strongly agrees and 83.3% agrees to the above condition.

B. The Learning I had in the College is useful in my Career:

Among DEO's, all are neutral to the condition that 'The Learning I had in the College is useful in my Career' and remaining are negligible.

- ➤ 100% of Services are also agrees to the same condition.
- ➤ About 40.0% and 60.0% of Student have agreed and strongly agreed to the above condition.
- Again, among Teachers, about 66.7% have agrees and 33.3% strongly agrees to the condition.

C. <u>Development Activities Organized by the College for My Overall Development are</u> Helpful:

- ➤ Among DEO's, about 100% disagree to the above condition and remaining are negligible.
- ➤ 100% of Services remained neutral towards the same condition.
- About 10.0% of Students have strongly disagreed and strongly agreed to this condition. Also 20.0% of them have both disagreed and neutral and 40.0% have agreed to the same condition.
- Again, among Teachers, about 16.7% are neutral, 66.7% agrees and 16.7% strongly agrees to the above condition.

D. Satisfaction about the College Campus Environment:

- Among DEO's, all are strongly agree that "Satisfaction about the College Campus Environment" and remaining are negligible.
- > 50% of Services are both neutral and strongly disagree to the same condition.
- ➤ The percentages of Students who remains neutral, agree and strongly agree to this condition are 10.0%, 60.0% and 30.0% respectively
- Again, among Teachers, about 50.0% are neutral, 16.7% agrees and 33.3% strongly agrees to the above condition.

E. Grievances are Properly Handled at the College:

- ➤ Among DEO's, about 100% are neutral that 'Grivances are properly handled at the college' and remaining are negligible.
- ➤ 50% of Services are both disagree and agree to the same condition.
- ➤ The percentages of Students who are neutral, agree and disagree to this condition are 30.0%, 50.0% and 20.0% respectively.
- Again, among Teachers, about 66.7% are neutral and 33.3% agrees to the condition.

F. Adequacy of Facilities as they were during my tenure as a Student at the College:

- Among DEO's, all are neutral to the given condition and remaining are negligible.
- > 50% of Services are both disagree and agree to the given condition and remaining is negligible.
- ➤ The percentages of Students who are neutral and agree to this condition are 40.0%, and 60.0% respectively.
- Again, 16.7% of Teachers are both disagree and agree to this condition and 33.3% of them remains neutral and strongly agree to the above condition.

- Among DEO's, about 100% remain neutral that 'Development in the College in recent years are appreciative' and remaining are negligible.
- ➤ 100% of Services are neutral to the above condition.
- ➤ The percentages of Students who are neutral, agree and strongly agree to this condition are 30.0%, 40.0% and 30.0% respectively
- Again, among Teachers, all of them, that is 100% agrees to the given condition.

H. The College is involving Alumni in its Activities:

- Among DEO's, about 100% strongly agree that 'The College is involving alumni in its activities' and remaining are negligible.
- > 50% of Services are both neutral and strongly agree to the above condition and remaining is negligible.

- ➤ About 20.0% of Students are neutral and 50.0% agrees and 30.0% strongly agrees to this condition.
- The percentage of Teachers who agrees and strongly agrees to this condition is same, i.e., 50.0%.

I The Alumni have a Role to Play in Financially Strengthening of the College:

- ➤ All DEO's strongly agree to the condition that 'the alumni have a role to play in financially strengthening of the college' and remaining are negligible.
- > 50% of Services are both neutral and strongly agree to the same condition.
- ➤ The percentage of Students who are both neutral and agree is 40.0% and about 20.0% of them have strongly agreed to this condition.
- ➤ Again, among Teachers, about 66.7% have agreed and 33.3% have strongly agreed to the given condition.

CONCLUSION:

Annexure III BEST PRACTICES

Best Practice 1:

Title: Teaching Science in nearby Secondary School

Goal: To improve the quality of teaching learning process in secondary level by showing some interesting fact.

Context: The basis of Indian education system lies in the elementary level. However, scientific thinking and motivation start from Secondary level. As per as the education system and the adequate facility is concerned, many secondary schools are not up to the mark of the basic standard required for teaching science, as maximum scientific facts based on experiment. Apart from that experiment as well as some demonstrations make the students interested and motivated to learn science.

The Practice: Some of the departments used to visit nearby schools and deliver lectures and show some experimental facts in the classrooms. The Department of Physics adopted a school in the nearby Maloibari village in Khetri in collaboration with IQAC and Indian Association of Physics Teacher (IAPT) RC-17.

Evidences of Success: It is difficult to assess the success of these programs, however, the students witnessed the simple basic science concept and motivated with live demonstration. They could also grasp the science behind each experiment.

Problem encountered: Lack of financial support to show extensive and interesting experiment in the school. Time constraint due to heavy class load during semesters of the college teacher makes it difficult to visit more schools and show experiments. Due to non-availability of adequate facility in the secondary school continuous effort could not be made in this regard. The science teacher should also be trained to teach science more effectively.

Best Practice 2:

Title: Collecting Feedback from various stakeholders.

Goal: To evaluate the overall progress in teaching-learning and administrative process.

Context: Taking feedback from all stakeholders plays an important role in evaluating the overall progress and finds the voids on the system. Feedback from different angle helps in all round development of the system. Preparation of feedback form is also crucial where all the possible attributes have to be included for different stakeholders. Effective feedback has benefits for both the giver and the receiver to take important decisions. Constructive feedback clarifies the expectations and helps the institution to modify and faculty to revisit the teaching learning process.

The Practice: Different feedback forms for various stakeholders (Student, Faculty, Alumni and Staff etc.) are prepared. Criteria based on the expectation of different stakeholders are prepared. Feedbacks are taken in five point scale. The responses are analysed and results are attached in the Annexure II.

Evidences of Success: Analyses as well as implementation of some suggestions has been done. An overall development has been observed in the college campus. Active participation of various stakeholders in feedback mechanism and fruitful suggestions has been observed. The college authority has been trying to improve the system.

Problem Encountered: Some non-productive feedbacks are also received, like the students having practical subjects hesitate to give the correct opinion. Maintenance of confidentiality is necessary for feedback system and analyses.
