CRITERION I: CURRICULAR ASPECTS

1.1 Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

Pragjyotish College is affiliated to the Gauhati University and registered under 2(F) and 12 (B) of the University Grants Commission Act, 1956. The Curriculum Planning and Implementation is performed by each teaching department of Gauhati University for undergraduate courses with the advice of Academic Registrar of Gauhati University. Moreover, each teaching department of the Gauhati University follows guidelines as issued by the Academic Registrar from time to time in planning process of Curriculum Development. Each teaching department of Gauhati University under the banner of 'Course Committee' has organized 'meets and discussions' with the active participation of some selected faculty members from 'post graduate departments' and 'undergraduate teaching department' from affiliated colleges as well.

The final outcome which is achieved through this process is finally submitted to the Academic Registrar for the final approval for implementation. The Academic Registrar discussed this issue in Academic Council Meeting and if the members of the Academic Council feel satisfied on the final outcome of the curriculum frame, they resolved for implementation and advised the Academic Registrar to do the needful.

The curriculum which is approved by the Academic Council of the Affiliating University i.e. Gauhati University is documented and uploaded in the Gauhati University website for effective circulation amongst the students. Moreover, a download link for curriculum is also facilitated in our college website.

Our college administration has developed an efficient mechanism to deliver the respective curriculum to the students. Adhering to the guidelines lay down by the State Government in general and the Gauhati University in particular, the College Administration developed an 'Academic Calendar' to serve for each year's academic session. The Institution follows a specific Time Table Programme from 9.00 am to 4.30 pm for the effective delivery and transaction of the curriculum. The recent addition of the Language Laboratory plays an important role in providing new vision to Students of MIL.

The college tries its level best to provide minimum 180 days of teaching in each academic session of the calendar year. The normal class duration for each class is 45 minutes which is started every weekday from 9.00 am till the 4.30 pm. In addition to normal class work, often some teachers engaged their students in seminar presentation and field-study work. The college Staff also put in extra labour and effort for running one Distance Education Programmes (KKHOSU). The college authority facilitates the deserved teachers to attend UGC based Refresher Course/ Orientation Courses / Workshops / Seminars or Short-Term Course to update their knowledge and information base.

2.5.2 Reforms initiated on Continuous Internal Evaluation (CIE) system at the institutional level (250 words)

Reforms as continuous internal evaluation has been initiated by the parent university i.e. Gauhati University. After proper evaluation of answer scripts of sessional examination, concerned teachers of the department show evaluated answer scripts to the students for their better performance. If any students fail to secure minimum passing marks or remain absent on the date of examination, the departments take outmost case to hold re-examination for them. Some of the departments have a good practice of conducting class tests, seminars, group discussions, as well as home assignments for the students which can be considered as a part of the CIE. Again all the departments have provisions for tutorial class which has been allotted in the college routine. The purpose is to clarify the doubts and re-explain the critical topics and also discuss the question papers of the previously held examination. The departmental seminar and discussion is conducted for upgrading the oral skills of the students. Power-Point presentation, monitoring the percentage of attendance of the students in theory and practical classes (Departments having practical) is practiced.

The college authority uniformly decentralises various administrative as well as academic tasks amongst teaching and non-teaching staff on various occasions along with student representatives, wherever necessary. Besides, there are instances where the college authority encourages the involvement of guardians as members of the Governing Body of the college. As such two seats are

reserved for the guardians in the GB of the college. Along with it, there are members from the teaching staff, parent affiliating university and the local MLA.

2. In each session, a general election is conducted for different portfolios of the students' union (PCSU), which comprises of the portfolios of President, Vice President, General Secretary, Secretaries of Minor and Major Games/ Sports and Boys' and Girls' Common Rooms, Debating, etc. The union body plays a very vital role in organising college week festivals, Saraswati Puja, publication of the college magazine (Pragjyotishiya) and celebration of other national/ international events under the guidance of their respective teacher-in-charges.

6.2 Strategy Development and Deployment

6.2.1 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following (with in 100 words each):

Curriculum Development: The College is affiliated to the Gauhati University and hence syllabus and curriculum are designed by the university. It is true that all faculties from the college cannot take direct part in the syllabus design. Nevertheless, teachers from different departments are members of the Committee on Courses and Studies (CCS) and takes active participation in the curriculum/syllabus development programme.

Teaching and Learning: The college has a general routine and every year it is reviewed by the routine committee for necessary modifications as per the available classrooms, in consultation with the heads of the academic departments. The college also makes provisions and arrangements in undertaking projects, excursions, field works and visits to higher educational/research institutions. Many departments hold talks inviting academicians and experts from other higher institutions, picking up topics which are related to their subject to give the students different exposure other than normal classroom teaching. Departmental seminars are presented by the students assigned to them. Field studies are conducted for students as per the requirement of curriculum with appropriate research methodology followed by preparation of field reports.

Examination and Evaluation: Semester-end examinations are conducted in the college as per the University rules/directions and schedules, and the process of evaluation is done by designated zone of the university. Teachers are assigned duties like invigilators, paper setters and examiners. Teachers from some departments are also appointed as external examiners in other colleges. Sessional examinations are conducted and evaluation done within the college. The end semester examinations and evaluations is under the control of the affiliating university. Sessional examinations for each semester and its subsequent evaluation are done under the directives of the affiliating university. Unit tests/Class tests are also conducted in some departments and the marks along with evaluating sheets are discussed with the students to explore their strengths and weaknesses for further improvement.

Research and Development: The college encourages research work in different streams and has been providing modest infrastructure in some of the departments to carry out research works. Several faculty members have obtained Ph.D guide-ship in the parent university and are actively involved in research works. Many of the faculty members are engaged in minor and major research projects funded by various funding agencies viz. UGC, DST, DBT. The college has also a Bio-Tech hub attached to the Zoology Department. Several faculty members have availed FDP for pursuing Ph.D. Teachers in some departments guide the 6th semester students in the preparation of their dissertation for part fulfilment of their 6th semester final examination. Moreover, teachers are encouraged to develop their research skill by participating in state/national/international level seminars in local and abroad also. The college authority has taken a decision to publish a research journal.

Library, ICT and Physical Infrastructure/Instrumentation: The college library has been partially upgraded by using SOUL.20. OPAC (Online Public Access Catalogues. Internet and photocopy facilities are provided in the library. Most of the departments are equipped with departmental libraries with books relevant to their syllabus and subjects. INFLIBNET and N-LIST services are available for teaching staff. Physical infrastructure development works include setting up of a modern conference hall and works for more

classroom and departmental accommodation.					
Human Resource Management: Discussions and meetings are conducted on a regular mode by the principal with the teaching and non-teaching staff for the smooth running of classes and other academic as well as administrative works. A vice principal has been appointed to supervise the functioning of academic activities in the absence of the principal. The Principal of the college who is also the Secretary of the Governing body by virtue of his office is directly involved in the day-to-day affairs of Human Resource Management of the college.					
Industry Interaction / Collaboration: The Master of Tourism Management (MTM) and Travel & Tourism Management (TTM) courses of the college are directly involved in industry interaction/ collaboration/ linkages. Students of these programmes are regularly sent students for on-job trainings. The department has direct collaboration with the Directorate of Tourism, Govt. of Assam, for internship of the students. Students are also sent to reputed travel agencies, resorts and hotels for private internships.					
Admission of Students: The admission of students is done strictly on merit basis. The admission schedule is notified through banners (in the college campus) and through newspaper advertisements. Offline mode is available to apply for any course. The terms and conditions of the admission are clearly stated in the prospectus. Reservations for various reserved are strictly maintained as per Assam Government rules. The Admission Committee formulates all the rules and regulations of admission and prepares a central merit list. On the scheduled dates, admission takes place as per the prepared merit list, after proper verification of the documents. Admission of students in the college is considered strictly on merit basis. The college also follows the rules and regulations for admission of students as set by the State Government and the affiliating university as well.

Best Practice 1:

Title of the Practice: Setting up of the Performing Arts Department

Objectives of the Practice: The Performing Arts Department has been set up in the college premises of the students. The subject performing arts in the context of the present scenario has become a vital component in overall development of the students fraternity, owing to the fact three department has been set up to enhance the innate skills in areas of interest in the cultural field like, Sattriya dance, Kathak dance, etc.

The Context: The subject Performing Arts broadly includes elements like Dance, Music, Theatre and Drama, which are all essential elements of culture, providing opportunity for the engagement of students through participation in formal and informal education sector. Performing Arts often aim to express one's emotions and feelings wherein the participants display these talents in front of a live audience.

The Practice: For the purpose of skill development of students the department offers courses in Sattriya Dance, Hindustani Music (vocal), Kathak Dance both in the Higher Secondary Level (10+2) level and as a One Year Diploma Course under Gauhati University. Accordingly, necessary infrastructural arrangement has been made in the form of classrooms for theory and practical sessions, musical instruments and a library.

Evidence of Success: Since its inception, the department has been actively involved in promoting students at various platforms to display their innate talents and skill through activities like participation in cultural programmes (e.g. in the Brahmaputra Literary Festival held in the month of January 2017), participation in street play on social issues, exposure of students with the team of 'Katha Nadi', a national award winning film so as to motivate them in the field of film making, engaging students through various cultural activities such as group dance, chorus on the occasion of Dr. Bhupen Hazarika International Solidarity Award Ceremony held at Rabindra Bhavan, Guwahati in April 2017, participation of students in Red FM College Ka Tashanbaaz Season – 5 and 6, where some of the students were short-listed in the grand finale at Cotton University. One of the students named Shabnam Nargis was runners up in the Drama Category, students performing the drama 'Kamala Konwari Sadhu' at Srimanta Sankardev Bhavan. NSD Auditorium, New Delhi in association with Cultural Subcommittee of Asom Sahitya Sabha, Asom Kala Tirtha and Datamation on 28th and 29th September, 2017.

Problems Encountered and Resources Required: The department was set up in January 2017 and since then there has been an increase in the enrolment of students. However, the place in which the enrolment as the students should have taken place is not found to be satisfactory. This is primarily because of the fact that despite the demand the students are unable to denote the required time needed for such exercise due to rigorous class schedule of the on-going course curriculum. So, the department has made an appeal to allot a specific time slot within the framework of the regular routine, so that the willing students can pursue their

interest in cultural activities.

Best Practice 2:

Title of the Practice: Promoting quality reading culture

Objectives of the Practice: The goal of this practice is to motivate the students to inculcate their reading habits. With the rapid advancement of science and technology, the current generation seems to deviate from the traditional reading habits to e-reading which seems to them to be easier and user- friendly. It has been felt that a balance should be maintained between these two practices for their overall academic excellence.

The Context: Pandit Tirthanath Sarma Library is one of the richest library in the NE Region with a stock house of as many as books, journals, magazines, etc. People from far flung areas come to visit this library to meet their need for knowledge and other academic pursuits. However it has been observed that the college fraternity moderately uses the library service.

The Practice: In this backdrop, the college authority with able guidance of the Librarian and the supporting staff, decided to take some steps, to encourage reading habits. The following measures were taken in this regard viz. Orientation Programme of teachers and students (newly-admitted), Best Library User Award for both teachers and students, Book Donation Camp, Book Bank, Celebration of Library's Day, Library Orientation Programme, etc. The Best Library User Award for 2016 - 2017 for Teacher awarded to Nivedita Devi (Sanskrit Dept.) and for student to Arup Kalita. An Orientation Programme for Teachers was conducted on 15th March 2017 and a similar programme for students was conducted during the period 14-17 June 2017.

Evidence of Success: With the introduction of these initiative, the following outcome has been observed: No of Library users' has increased; Exposure of students to different library services and amenities; Increased frequency of visit to the library (teachers/ students); Increase in the number of books in the book banks; Increase in the number of students using book bank facility;

Problems Encountered and Resources Required: Despite a noticeable increase of library users, the rate of increase is not up to mark with the continuation of this practice, the college authority is optimistic that in the coming years there will be a significant increase among library users and thus the goal of promoting reading book will be achieved.

Best Practice 3:

Title of the Practice: In-house publications of the institution

Objectives of the Practice: The objectives of this practice is to bring out a number of in-house publications through the already existing Publication Hub and some other miscellaneous publications, primarily research publications

The Context: The Publication Hub was set up in March 2016, with a view to undertake publications works of various forms of in-house publications. In addition, the Pragjyotish College Research Council (PCRC) was also set up on 03.08.2015, which apart from monitoring the research-related works of the faculty members also contemplated in bringing out an in-house research publication from the college.

The Practice: The Publication Hub as a follow-up of its previous year activities started compilation and editing

works for the first volume of the century-old “Chetana”. In this initiative, college authority sanctioned generous amounts from the college fund to the Publishing Hub, for printing works. ISBNs were already available with the college, which was procured a few years earlier. The editorial board of the PCRC started editing works of the in-house multidisciplinary research-based journal of the college (Prag Consilience) from the last session i.e. 2015-16. The editorial board was constituted in an IQAC meeting held on 29.10.2015 and all editing and publication works could be completed within August 2016.

Evidence of Success: As a result of persistent efforts, the first volume of “Chetana” could be launched in the month of December 2016. This initiative generated tremendous appreciation from the intelligentsia both in the print and social media. As a mark of the whole-hearted efforts of the editorial team, the first issue of Prag Consilience was inaugurated on 29.08.2016. Within the next few months, the journal could obtain the RNI No. (ASSMUL/2016/70132) and also the ISSN (2456-6861).

Problems Encountered and Resources Required: It was a Herculean task as several issues were missing and large amount of effort was to be put in tracing out the volumes through a variety of efforts ranging from appeals made through print media, social media and personal visits to various libraries.

- Magic show by the students of Chemistry Department
- Geological model exhibition under the aegis of Geological Society of Pragjyotish College (GSoPC)
- Observation of World Environment Day by the Botany Department which includes popular talk selected to environment, plantation of trees etc
- Publication of Departmental Newsletters (“Boson” by the Chemistry Department)
- Encouraging students to write scientific articles in departmental Wall Magazines and the College Magazine. It is believed that such type of activities will help them to develop their scientific abilities and increase their rational capabilities

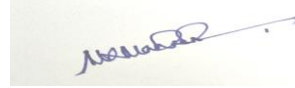
