The Institution has been using the College Automation (2009 Professional), Version 9.0 Professional Edition from the academic session 2008-09, developed by S. S. Technologies. Information related to various student-related parameters viz. shift-wise students list, caste-wise students list, gender-wise students list, major subject-wise students list, subject combination-wise student lists, registration number-wise students list, religion-wise students list, hostel-boarders list, institution last attended, etc can be obtained through use of this information system. For keeping details pertaining to financial transactions, the Tally Accounting Software has been in use since 2009.

CRITERION I: CURRICULAR ASPECTS

1.1 Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words The subjective aspects as outlined in the syllabi of the various subjects taught in the institution are delivered through a planned mechanism with the aid of various tools and processes. A class routine is prepared before the beginning of every academic session by a Routine Committee constituted by the Principal, which is not only responsible for allocation of various classrooms as per necessity of various subjects in the routine but also is responsible for removing any anomalies that might arise after the start of the classes, mostly pertaining to room capacity. Every department maintains a Daily Class Monitoring Diary (devised by IQAC), which is an authentic record of all the classes taken by the faculty members. Moreover, each of the faculty members maintains a Lesson Plan (devised by IQAC), which is used for delivery of the topics allotted against each of them in the various semesters. Practical classes are held as per allotted schedule in the class routine, but for final year students, practical classes of the major course subjects are held in the department outside the fixed schedules, if necessity arises, since these batches of students do not have to attend general course classes in other departments and hence remain for the whole day in their major course department. Departmental Advisory Committee meetings are convened by the Heads of Departments at regular intervals for taking making assessments of syllabus completion status by the individual faculty members, as well as for planning for other academic activities like holding of student seminars, field works, class tests, allotment of assignments, etc. In subjects where field works/ institutional visits are mandatory and part of the syllabus, the heads of departments either allocates the field-in-charges for any upcoming field work or it comes as a voluntary agreement on the part of the teachers. The field-in-charges makes arrangement for planning the journey schedule and takes care of all logistic requirements that might arise in connection with the field works viz. planning of the schedule, purchase of tickets, arrangement of stays, arrangement for local transportation, tie-ups with other institutional heads (in case of institutional visits), and finally assisting the students in the preparation of the field reports. The field reports are normally returned to the students as there is shortage of storage space in the departments, but one or two exceptional reports are retained back in the respective departments. In departments like Geology, the home assignments submitted by the students are stocked in the department, which forms a good source of reference material to the students. Students are also made to deliver seminars on topics allotted in their respective syllabi in some departments, mainly through power-point mode, and where active interaction between peers and teachers takes place. The internal assessment marks of the students are allotted differently by different departments on the basis of different parameters like class attendance, student seminars, home assignments, etc.

1.4.2 How the feedback obtained is being analyzed and utilized for overall development of the institution? (maximum 500 words)

Although feedback was obtained from various stakeholders like students, teachers and non-teaching staff was obtained during the current assessment year, analyses could not be carried out (like the previous 2 years viz. 2015-16, 2016-17) due to unavailability of the requisite software in the Statistics Department, which has been the nodal department to carry out the analyses part. However, the institution has given optimum efforts to come up with various innovative actions through the IQAC, for overall development of the institution.

Apart from the formal feedback system as envisaged and prescribed, the administration also takes heed of non-formal feedback from the various stakeholders blended with individual jurisprudence on the part of the principal (as the administrative head) and the Governing Body for planning and executing various developmental works in the institution for its overall development. Informal interaction with the various stakeholders on different occasions has also led to the formation of ideas and opinions regarding developmental aspects of the institution. The parent-teacher meetings held at various departments has served to elicit opinions from the guardians on various developmental aspects of the institution has a close bonding with the nearby Santipur locality (where the college is situated). The local people frequent the campus for a variety of reasons and informal interaction with different individuals of the institutional locality has become more of a routine affair. Several ideas on important developmental aspects have crystallized in that way also.

'Formal mentoring system has not yet been effective in the institution. However, the faculty members maintain close rapport with the students (especially the students from the major course) and assist them in various aspects pertaining to their career and personal issues. The field works that are carried on in some of the departments is a good opportunity for the students and the faculty members for developing good personal bonds as good period of time is spent together during travelling and overnight stays in outstation places. The close bonding between the teachers and the taught also gets developed through a variety of works and activities in different departments like departmental functions (freshmen social and farewell functions), designing of departmental wall magazines, activities of student societies, etc. This way, faculty members get to know about their personal traits and also the opportunity to serve as their informal mentors.

2.5.2 Reforms initiated on Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level (250 words) As the internal evaluation system for various courses and programmes is being done under the guidelines prescribed by the affiliating university, it is not possible to undertake massive reforms in the CIE system. Even though, the college looks into the fact that the sessional examinations (as envisaged by the university as part of the CIE), are carried on smoothly and in a hassle-free manner. A designated committee is appointed which is responsible for preparing a subject-wise examination routine for the various academic departments. The departments normally holds the examinations as per this prescribed routine, but sometimes makes slight adjustments under unwarranted circumstances. The faculty members of the individual departments after completing the tasks of question paper setting sends the hard and soft copies to the designated committee which takes the task of finalizing it in the printed form, after which the question papers are supplied back to the departments in the required quantities. The committee also undertakes the responsibility of sending blank answer-script booklets in the required quantities to the individual departments well ahead of the examination schedule. The answer-scripts are evaluated at the departmental level and the marks retained till the term-end examinations, when it has to be sent to the university.

2.5.3 Academic calendar prepared and adhered for conduct of Examination and other related matters (250 words)

An academic calendar is prepared by the institution through the IOAC after the publication of the affiliating university's academic calendar cum holiday list and is either uploaded in the institutional website or is distributed amongst the students in printed form. This calendar incorporates various important events and activities planned during the academic year viz. tentative schedule of the various examinations, field visits, different in-house activities/events like observance of college annual foundation day, annual college week celebration, college general freshmen social and departmental freshmen social functions, student union elections, etc, in addition to the list of various important holidays during the year. However, different miscellaneous events/celebrations that take place within short preparation schedules are excluded from the purview of this academic calendar. Sessional examinations are conducted as per schedule as outlined in the academic calendars, whereas the holding of term-end examinations may not hold true, as these examination schedules are decided by the university authorities.

4.4.2 Procedures and policies for maintaining and utilizing physical, academic and support facilities - laboratory, library, sports complex, computers, classrooms etc. (*maximum 500 words*) (information to be available in institutional Website, provide link)

The procedures and policies for utilizing various facilities vary in different extents. The policies for using the college library are outlined in detail in the college prospectus. The computers in the different academic departments are used by the academic staff and the students as well for different purposes, the former using those for administrative and academic purpose while the latter for academic usage like preparation of field reports, accessing web resources, e-learning resources, practical works, etc. For such usages, there is no formal policy devised. The classrooms are of two categories, viz. departmental and common. The former types are exclusively meant for holding respective classes of the department, while the latter category is shared by many departments as per the central class routine. These rooms are also used exclusively during the examination time, as decided by the individual examination committees appointed for the different examinations. However, for outside examinations (that are normally held during Sundays), the college obtains a centre fee, that varies to great extents (either lump sum or per candidate basis). The college canteen is monitored by a Canteen Monitoring Committee, which looks into the qualitative aspects. The canteen functions on a lease basis with private partners. Laboratories in various departments functions under the strict control of the respective departmental heads and the laboratory bearers (both sanctioned and non-sanctioned) are responsible for maintaining the laboratory facilities, under instruction from the departmental heads. The Bio-tech Hub of the college is amalgamated with the Zoology Department. The Language Lab of the college is coordinated from the English Department, which caters to the need of all the six language departments viz. Assamese, Bengali, Bodo, English, Hindi and Sanskrit. The GIS Lab is affiliated to the Geography department, which is responsible for its functioning and maintenance. The Pragiyotish College Publication Hub functions under a designated committee appointed by the Principal. There is a Sports and Games Promotion Committee for maintaining the sports infrastructural facilities like the Basket Ball Court and the Sports Library.

6.1 Institutional Vision and Leadership

6.1.1 Mention two practices of decentralization and participative management during the last year (maximum 500 words)

1. A total number of 20 (in the first phase), 23 (in the second phase) in-house committees/bodies/cells etc has been either reconstituted or newly constituted during the year for smooth running of the various internal affairs of the college. The reconstitution process was completed through a five-member committee, constituted vide IQAC Core Committee meeting resolution (No. 2017/001 (c), dated 09.08.2017). The selection of the committees has been approved vide Governing Body resolutions adopted in the meetings held on 08.03.2018 and 05.06.2018. A few other committees were directly constituted by the Principal of the college, through informal consultation with the IQAC coordinator. These members of these in-house committees comprise of faculty members of both the categories viz. those from the sanctioned posts and those who are serving as full-time teachers in non-sanctioned posts. The salient feature of the entire process was that the selection committee appointed for these committees only selected the conveners/coordinators of the individual committees/cells/bodies and were given full freedom to appoint/co-opt the members in their allotted domain, as per their choice (No. 2018/028, dated 27.01.2018).. This initiative was undertaken to obtain optimum performance from the different bodies, since the conveners were given full freedom to choose the members of their personal choice and preference.

2. The IQAC vide Core Committee meeting resolution (No. 2018/033, dated 27.01.2018) has sought to allocate specific duties to the various IQAC Core Committee members for streamlining and smooth functioning if IQAC tasks. Accordingly, all the members were allocated/assigned various duties viz. office matters, outreach programmes, student-related matters, GB matters, in-house committee related matters, financial matters, policy resolution and implementation, website updating matters, office maintenance and filing, API-related matters, library matters, NCC & NSS matters, hostel matters, etc.

6.2 Strategy Development and Deployment

6.2.1 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following (with in 100 words each):

<u>Curriculum Development</u>: Development of curriculum is outside the purview of the institution, the college being an affiliated college under Gauhati University. However, the departments of Fine Arts and Performing Arts have taken initiative for development of course curriculum for introduction of certain new courses in the respective departments. Both the departments have developed curriculum for two new courses viz. Diploma in Fine Arts and Diploma in Performing Arts (Sattriya Dance and Hindustani Vocal). In addition, the faculty members, who are members of the Committee of Courses and Studies (CCS) under Gauhati University took active part in the development of the CBCS curriculum under Gauhati University, which is contemplating in introducing CBCS in the undergraduate courses at an early date.

Teaching and Learning: The IQAC has resolved to

- develop modalities for a student mentoring system in every academic department (No. 2017/012 (a), dated 09.08.2017)
- develop modalities for utilization of all the existing Smart Class Rooms of the college on a sharing formula between all the academic departments (No. 2017/017, dated 09.08.2017)
- conduct Departmental Advisory Committee meetings on a periodical basis for reviewing departmental activities/academic pursuits/planning etc (No. 2017/007 (c), dated 09.08.2017).
- advise every academic department to maintain the attendance system in the numerical numbering format (No. 2017/004 (a), dated 09.08.2017)

Accordingly the Convener, Academic Committee was instructed to do the needful (vide letter No. PC/IQAC/INT/2018/604, dated 27.04.2018).

One additional Smart Classroom has been augmented in the assessment year, apart from the already existing six of the kind.

<u>Examination and Evaluation</u>: Examination and evaluation works were completed within the guidelines stipulated by the parent university and as per scheduled dates outlined in the academic calendar.

<u>Research and Development</u>: Although the institution has limitations in the development of infrastructure related to research and development, it has given its effort to upgrade the library resources for being used in future by various faculty members who intends to pursue various forms of research. The second volume of the in-house multi-disciplinary multi-lingual and peer-reviewed research journal has also been published during the current year, wherein different faculty members had contributed research papers.

Library, ICT and Physical Infrastructure / Instrumentation: Considerable improvements have been made in the physical infrastructural provisions during the year. The IQAC resolved to procure the Students Database Management System for the management of a large volume of student-related information (No. 2017/020 (a), dated 09.08.2017). It was decided to complete the ground floor of the New Arts Block (for housing four academic departments viz. Economics, History, Mathematics and Philosophy) and started functioning from the 2018-19 academic session onwards. A new Conference cum Classroom has been constructed from the funds accumulated from the MA (Assamese) course and started functioning. It was decided to increase the server space of the college website (No. 2018/035 (b), dated 27.01.2018)

<u>Human Resource Management</u>: All faculty members have been engaged in different in-house committees/cells etc of the college as per their capacity and preference of choice by the conveners/coordinators of the respective bodies, for achieving optimum performance levels. The IQAC has also reconstituted the seven numbers of AQAR Preparation Sub-Committees for early completion of the AQARs that were being left pending from 2011 onwards. Some members of these sub-committees served in the earlier existing committees, while some were new members. The IQAC has designed a new format of leave application which is presently in use, and which has done away with the former practice of applying leave in plain paper (No. 2017/003, dated 09.08.2017).. The format is downloadable from the institutional website; one portion of the format is retained in the departments while the other portion is retained in the college office. Moreover, the IQAC has initiated to pile up huge stockpile of information in the office on various aspects pertaining to employees joining dates, retirement dates, home addresses, phone numbers, email ids, Ph.D and M.Phil details, etc.

<u>Industry Interaction/ Collaboration</u>: As in previous years, the venue for holding the preliminary rounds for International Earth Science Olympiad (in collaboration with Geological Society of India) could be made at Pragjyotish College. Three volumes of a century-old magazine "Chetana" has been published by the Pragjyotish College Publication Hub in active collaboration with the Ambikagiri Memorial Trust. Different events were also held in the college through collaborative mode with different organizations. Attempts were being made to install an ATM in the college campus through collaborative mode. However, the plan is yet to materialize. The college provides space to two martial art organizations (viz. *Mawate-Ka-Shito Ryu Karate-Do Association* and *Academy of Karate Athletes*) for imparting martial art classes to children and youth from the surrounding greater Santipur locality. The Students' Counselling Centre has collaborated with external members as members of the centre.

<u>Admission of Students</u>: In order to mitigate the problem of allocation of Major to the students after admission, a strategy was adopted to allocate major at the time of admission. Moreover, the online mode of submission of admission forms field was adopted in the current year, which started a year back.

6.2.2: Implementation of e-governance in areas of operations

<u>Planning and Development</u>: The college has procured an online dynamic student information system (Student

Database Management System), which is capable of generating session-wise students lists, and other data lists related to gender, categories, etc. Once this system is functional, there will be separate department login and administrative login systems, whereby each academic department will be able to upload student details like attendance, results, participation in field works, etc, information pertaining to which will be used for different planning and development works.

<u>Administration</u>: The IQAC has resolved to adopt paperless communication for various in-house matters and in order to achieve this goal has taken the initiative to compile the WhatsApp Numbers and E-mail IDs of various faculty members.

<u>Finance and Accounts</u>: The college continued with the already established Tally system of accounting in its office, which is operational since 2009. Salary bills of the permanent staff being sent online to the treasury. No other new initiatives took place during the period.

<u>Student Admission and Support</u>: The Admission Committee has resolved to continue the online student admission process that was initiated in the previous year. Moreover, the government scholarships received by the students are deposited in their respective bank accounts through online payment gateways.

<u>Examination</u>: The Student Database Management System procured by the college shall serve to store all examination details of the students, along with the attendance count (a mandatory factor linked with the eligibility conditions for appearing in any term-end examinations). Moreover, the Gauhati University introduced a online system of registration of paper examiners from the 2017-18 session onwards.

### **Best Practice: 1**

<u>Title of the Practice</u>: Institutional Adoption Scheme

Objectives of the Practice: The goal of this practice is to upgrade some school located in the vicinity of the college by way of sponsoring for improvement of infrastructural facilities which the institutions lack.

<u>The Context</u>: Three neighbouring school viz. Pragati Pathsala Primary School at Santipur, ME Girls' School and Santipur High School have been selected for the aforesaid purpose, as these school lack in basic infrastructural facilities in terms of boundary walls, proper classroom facilities and also in need of some renovation and repairing works.

<u>The Practice</u>: Amongst these three schools, the Pragati Pathsala Primary School has been selected as the first priority in terms of infrastructural development as the school has been in a most dilapidated condition. Accordingly, construction, renovation and repairing works started. The boundary wall was constructed, 15 sets of desks-benches, 8 nos. of fans were provided. The ceilings in the entire school building were renovated. Roofs were replaced by new galvanized tin sheets. The whole school was painted and entrance gate was constructed. The college also extended infrastructural aid to "Indian Institute of Research and Development (IIRD) for differently abled students by way of donating 1 steel almirah, 1 office table, 11 wooden desks and 9 banners.

<u>Evidence of Success</u>: The Pragati Pathsala Primary School authorities acknowledged the effort of our institution through an acknowledgement letter, expressing sincere gratitude for the yeoman service done to the institute for the larger cause of promoting primary education. Likewise IIRD also offered their heart full gratitude and sincere thanks for such an endeavour. The success of this practice is clearly represented pictorially in the weblink provided.

<u>Problems Encountered and Resources Required</u>: For effective realisation of this practice, huge funds need to be generated which is a herculean task as the college fund does not support such practice on large scale and regular basis. So, initially an appeal has been made to all sanctioned and non-sanctioned teaching staff to denote generously for the cause. However, the lacunae lie in the fact that had the donations been more generous, we could have striven for much better, qualitative and quantitative infrastructure development of the adopted school.

#### **Best Practice: 2**

**<u>Title of the Practice</u>**: Setting up of a Language Laboratory

<u>Objectives of the Practice</u>: The goal of this lab is to design and conduct crash courses for improving the language skills especially the speaking skills of the students in addition to conduct some programs and workshops on translation studies.

<u>The Context</u>: One of the latest editions to the infrastructure of Pragjyotish College is the language lab set up in 2017, to meet growing demands of students working to develop the speaking skills, soft skills and personality development.

<u>The Practice</u>: The language lab was positioned on the second floor of the English and Statistics block. The six language departments of the college viz. Assamese, Bengali, Bodo, Hindi, Sanskrit, and English share this lab. Each department is free to design and conduct courses catering to the needs of the students. The lab acts as a platform for the pursuit of interdisciplinary studies through the conduct of collaborative programmes and workshops on translation studies.

<u>Evidence of Success</u>: The lab started functioning from 12th December, 2017. Since its inception the lab has conducted a workshop on technical uses of Hindi and languages of N. E. India on 16th December, 2017. Moreover, the English and Hindi departments of the institution regularly conduct linguistic classes in the lab.

**<u>Problems Encountered and Resources Required:</u>** Initially no problems have been encountered.

The IQAC during the current year also had time constraints as it was preparing for the next assessment cycle and pending AQARs from 2010 onwards had to be
