- To foster leadership qualities in the students exploiting their fullest potentials.
- To inculcate value of patriotism, internl discipline, in thoughts and actions.
- To foster a healthy interpersonal relationship amongst the students.
- To promote a scientific and rational thinking amongst the students.
- To create a congenial environment for the all-round development of the students in their future life.

6.2 Does the Institution has a management Information System

The college does not have a Management Information System (MIS). The College ensures a system of organized and channeled management information flow and decision making processes through different bodies like Governing Body, and the Finance Committee for various administrative works, under the leadership and guidance of the Principal.

6.3 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following:

6.3.1 Curriculum Development

The College is affiliated to Gauhati University and hence syllabus and curriculum are designed by the university (parent institution). Nevertheless, a large number of teachers from different department are members of the syllabus committee for curriculum restructuring/ revision/ syllabus development. Faculty members attended curriculum development workshops organized by the University and other colleges and suggestions are given accordingly.

6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

- A general routine is prepared by the routine committee and classrooms are allotted as per the requirement of each department. The Head of the Department makes all the necessary rectification concerning the departmental activities.
- Provisions are also made for undertaking necessary projects, excursion, field works, visit to higher educational institutions like IIT Guwahati, Gauhati University etc.
- Group discussion, seminars, course related quiz, surprise test etc. are held round the year so that there is active involvement of the students in the teaching learning process.
- Remedial classes are also held towards the end of each session to help the academically weak students.
- Study materials and home assignments are also given to the students for their comprehensive learning. Students are given help and training in the use of computer services and are informed about the availability of reading materials and e-resources for the prescribed syllabus.
 - Talks by scholars and renowned personalities are arranged to motivate students to achieve higher goals.

6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

Examination and evaluation are conducted as per the rules/direction of the university. The teaching staffs take active part in all the required confidential works. The college is also an important Examination Zonal Centre for different streams and semesters conducted by the university. Spot evaluations of final examination are done by the faculty members in examination zones fixed by the University. In the sessional examinations, there is in-house evaluation which is completed within a specified time.

6.3.4 Research and Development

- The college authority encourages research work. Some faculty members have guideship for Ph.D and hence are actively involved in research work. Pragjyotish College Research Council (PCRC) formulates the strategies for Research and Development of the College and encourages its faculty members to apply for Minor and Major Research Projects from UGC and other funding agencies. The PCRC examines the research proposals of the faculties and approves for submission. As a result of constant encouragement by the college, about 35 per cent of permanent faculties have completed PhD and few others are pursuing.
- The college encourages the faculty members to present research papers in seminars and conferences and publish the papers in peer reviewed journals.
- The college encourages and sanctions leave to its staff to attend FDP, Orientation programmes, Refresher Courses and Short term courses so that they can update their domain knowledge and also get acquainted with the latest developments and teaching methods.
- The college has received 10(ten) ISBN and will be publishing books shortly.
- The college has also applied for a Bio-Technology Hub to enhance knowledge related to Life sciences.

6.3.5 Library, ICT and physical infrastructure / instrumentation

Library

The college library plays vital role in the development of academic and imparting knowledge to the students as well as teaching staff of the college. It has a good collection of books and journals to meet the needs of the student as well as the teaching staff. The main aim of our library is to maximize the use of learning resources and satisfaction of readers by improving efficiency of the system.

- Library is partially automated.
- Book bank facility is available for the economically weak students.
- New text books as per syllabus have been added.
- New reference and competitive examination books for the students have been added.
- New subject journals, popular magazines, weeklies are subscribed regularly.
- New computers are procured for smooth functioning of the library.

ICT and physical infrastructure

• College administration is gradually adopting ICT. The staff is being given training on various aspects of automation and office management.

6.3.6 Human Resource Management

- Regular meeting are conducted by the Principal with the teaching and non-teaching staff for the smooth conduct of classes and other academic related affairs.
- All the departments are provided separate teacher common rooms so that the faculty members can relax and prepare well for their classes.
- As part of the effort of encouraging research and development the college library has a good collection of books, journals and e-journals catering to different subjects.
- College library also regularly procures reference books for the faculty members.

6.3.7 Faculty and Staff recruitment

- The college takes every possible measure to fill the vacant posts as early as possible. Appointments of permanent faculty are made through advertisement in printed and electronics media. The college also appoints guest faculty to make up for the shortage of faculty in some departments.
- Computer literacy of the newly recruited staff is also considered as desirable qualification.

6.3.8 Industry Interaction / Collaboration

- Department of Tourism Management has collaborated with Sikkim Government in recruiting from passed out students.
- The college also interacts with the industry as and when required. Various commercial and industrial organisations provide sponsorship in various college programmes like seminar, workshop, lecture, silver jubilee celebration etc.
- The college has organized many literary programmes in collaboration with Asom Sahitya Sabha, the apex literary organization of the state.

6.3.9 Admission of Students

The admission processes are done strictly on the basis of merit. A central merit list is prepared before admission and seats are allotted as per the merit list. Reservations for OBC, ST(P), ST(H),PH are maintained as per Assam Government rules. The terms and conditions of the admission processes are clearly stated in the college prospectus and accordingly carried out. The process of admitting students to the programmes offered by the college is by a transparent, well administered mechanism. The following steps are followed in admission procedure to ensure publicity and transparency-

- Advertisements are published in local dailies (both Assamese and English) wherein all relevant dates are mentioned.
- Complete details are also placed on the college website to facilitate online access to the requisite information about the college admission procedure.
- Prospectus and forms are collected from the college office by the candidates on payments. While the prospectus contains all the details of the admission procedure, the bio-data and academic records of the students are to be given in the form.
- The submitted forms are sorted by the admission committee headed by the Principal and a Convenor.





 - For the condition, college provides opportunities and support to the staff and their family members, the Non-Teaching agree with 38.46% and 30.77% are Neutral, remaining are negligible.

CONCLUSION: Overall about 92.31%, 84.62% and 61.54% of Non-Teaching members respectively agree to the conditions 'procedures followed in the college', 'office staff relationships are fine', and 'employees grievances are settled fairly' for the year 2010-11. Also 69.23% of them remain neutral towards the condition 'infrastructure facilities are supporting the work environment'.

- 6. **Problem Encountered and Resources Required**: Boundary walls of the ponds are being damaged due to erosion which requires urgent repairing.
