### **OUTCOME (PSO)**

#### **BA English Honours (FYUGP)**

The programme specific outcome of the syllabus prescribed as per Gauhati University under NEP 2020 for the Honours students of English is mentioned below:

- PSO1: Knowledge about the history, evolution and chronology of English literature through the reading of the units that are divided according to different periods of English Literature. These are the base of English literature which the student will accumulate through the programme.
- PSO2: The students will be acquainted with different technical terms and its usages, different forms and genres of English Literature which are the building blocks of the foundation.
- PSO3: Students will also learn the technicalities of composing poetries, scanning them and to discern meaning from them. Figures of speech, rhetoric and prosody are an important part of poetry reading and writing which the students will learn.
- PSO4: Students will be able to learn Grammar and comprehension like analyzing, summarising, problem-solving etc on a higher level from what they have already learnt in school and apply them in literary texts.
- PSO5: The students will get to read and learn literary texts of all genres- poetry, fiction, drama, non-fiction etc on the basis of the periods of English literature which makes it easy for the students to identify the themes and social conditions of the particular period that the text belongs to.
- PSO5: Students will also be acquainted with literatures of different Indian regions apart from just English literature. At the later stage of the programme, focussed genres of literature are included like Women writing, literatures related to the environment, Indian English writing along with region specific literature like North-eastern literature

which will help the students to learn and understand the kind of themes and topics of the same.

- PSO6: Through the optional papers like American literature, Indian English Literature, Shakespeare, Contemporary Writing, Life-writing etc, the students will be able to concentrate on their specific interest area on which they can further go for higher studies.
- PSO7: The basics and concepts of literary theories and criticism comprise one whole paper through which the students will be able to understand and apply those in places where necessary. The students will be able to go deep into the meaning of a text and analyse it properly, they will gain knowledge on how to read a text not just literally but to read between the lines and analyse it.
  - PSO8: The students will also gain knowledge on Modern and Post-Modern English Literature and issues and ideas prevailing in the contemporary society along with the knowledge on diverse societies and cultures, political and literary movements.
  - PSO9: Students will also gain knowledge about the interrelation of life with literature through their study of a wide variety of texts and genres of literature.
